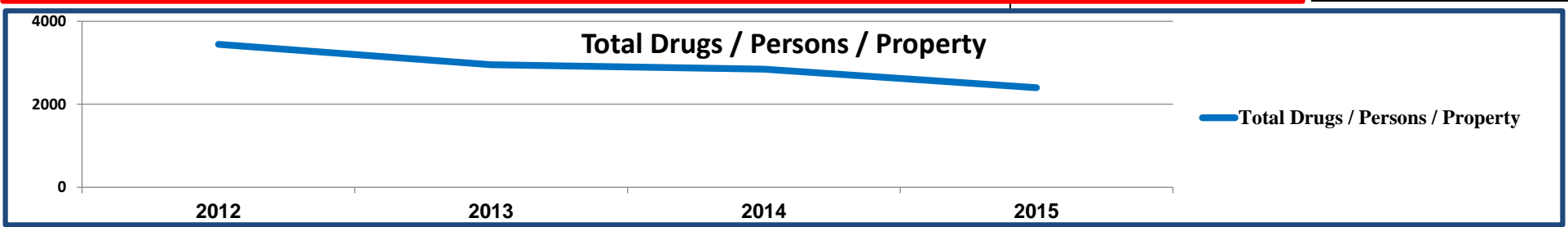

Summary

HRM Policing Partners launched Crime Reduction Strategies beginning in 2010, employing Crime Analysis to help drive operations. Crime Analysis enables HRM Police to identify prolific offenders, target hot spots, provide visual literacy via crime mapping, and generate sustainable partnerships while becoming leaders within Nova Scotia. The Comstat model across all Divisions and Districts in HRM tracks and maps specific crime data to help make strategic human resource deployments for patrol and street level officers. Significant reductions over the last 4 years as shown for each agency depicts targeted crimes reduced at the street level and validates that this is an effective, efficient model. These types of reductions enable Police to focus efforts in Hybrid Hub, a risk driven, collaborative youth intervention model, Road Safety and other crime reduction initiatives collectively making HRM a safe place to live, work and have fun!

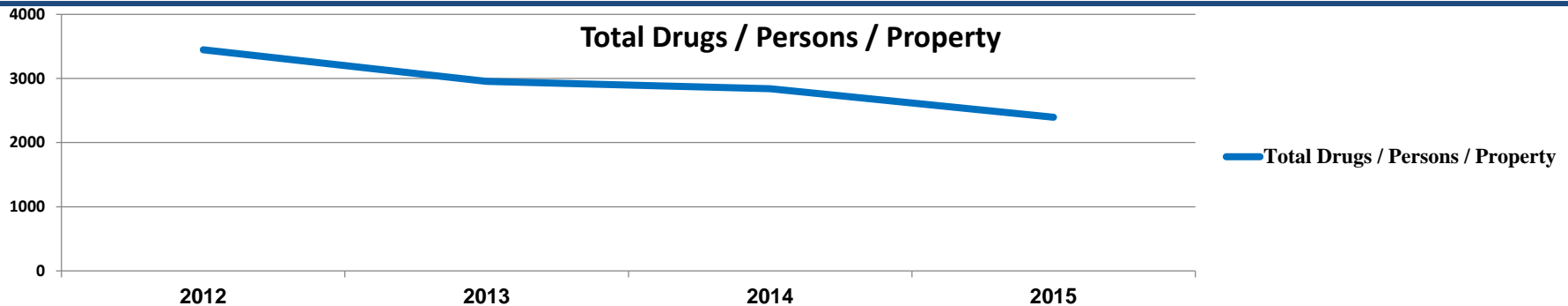
