African Heritage Month 2014





Seized Firearms Jan. 1 to 26



Total Firearms in Property Jan. 1 to 26




Firearms Discharged









Calls for Service

Comstat Overview

Comstat incidents comprise break and enters, mischief, property damage, thefts from vehicles, thefts of vehicles, robbery, weapon-related offences, assault causing bodily harm, assault with a weapon, aggravated assault and drug-related offences.

Central Division

Over the past two weeks, Central Division had 43 Comstatrelated incidents. Property offences were down and there were no thefts of vehicles over the past two weeks, one break and enter, and mischief/property damage incidents decreased by 65 per cent. Crimes against people increased slightly. Pro-active focus will be in the Downtown area as well as the area around Citadel High School for the next two weeks.

East Division

Over the past two weeks, East Division had 71 Comstatrelated incidents. The Division saw a general increase in most offence types, although no significant crime trends have persisted. Pro-active focus will be directed to the Downtown areas which have seen a clustering of theft from vehicles and other property-related offences. Enforcement of court-imposed conditions through breach checks on known offenders continues throughout the Division.

West Division

Over the past two weeks, West Division had 78 Comstat-related incidents. There has been a slight increase in property-related incidents, specifically in regard to theft from vehicles and break and enter incidents. A suspect identified through Comstat was apprehended and charged after a break into the Needs Convenience Store on Lacewood Drive and is also a suspect in another commercial break in the same area. Crimes against people have increased, specifically offences involving weapons. Five aggravated assault incidents were reported; two were domestic-related and three involved people known to each other. Breaks in the Fairview/Clayton Park area will be the focus for this period.

211 has information on more than 4,000 services including:


- Mental health and addition services





Comstat Overview

Comstat incidents comprise break and enters, mischief, property damage, thefts from vehicles, thefts of vehicles, robbery, weapon-related offences, assault causing bodily harm, assault with a weapon, aggravated assault and drug-related offences.

Central Division

Over the past two weeks, Central Division had 70 Comstatrelated incidents. This is an increase of 25 per cent over the previous period; however, 31 of these incidents were drugrelated files, the majority of which were pro-active work. Although property-related offences decreased overall, there has been an increase in theft from vehicles over this period. The majority of the thefts from vehicles have involved unlocked vehicles. The pro-active focus area for the next two weeks will remain in the Downtown area. In addition, proactive focus will be given to the area surrounding Dalhousie University as a result of the two recent robberies in that area.

East Division

Over the past two weeks, East Division had 49 Comstat-related incidents. In the last two weeks, three break and enters targeting lap tops from private properties have occurred around the downtown area. Meanwhile, pro-active focus has shifted to the Albro Lake area.

West Division

Over the past two weeks, West Division had 76 Comstatrelated incidents. This is an overall increase of 20 incidents. Property offences, theft from vehicles and break and enters all increased over the previous period. Drug incidents also increased as a direct result of pro-active work mainly in the Fairview area. The focus for this period will continue to be Fairview.
