Halifax Regional Police Environmental Scan of Preliminary Crime Statistics 4th Quarter 2013

Total City Wide Criminal Code Offences/Drugs

Total Criminal Code offences reported in the 4th quarter of 2013 show a decrease of -197 reported offences or a % of change = -5% compared to the 4th quarter of 2012. Drugs for 4th quarter 2013 show an increase of 31 offences or a % of change = 19% compared to 4th quarter 2012.

Property offences account for 56% of reported C.C.C. offences, while crimes against persons account for 13% and other criminal code offences account for 31%.

Property Crimes

Property crime shows a decrease of -19 reported offences or -1% of change.

Stolen motor vehicles decreased by -17 offences or a % of change = -18%.

Break and Enters decreased by -22 offences or a % of change = -10%.

Fraud decreased by -31 offences or a % of change = -12%.

Violent Crimes

Violent crimes has experienced a decrease in the 4th quarter of 2013 over 2012 by -46 offences or a % of change = -8%.

Robberies increased by 8 offences or a % of change = 18%.

Homicides show an increase, reporting 0 in the 4th quarter of 2012 and 2 in 4th quarter 2013. Attempt murders increased by 4 with 3 in 2012 and 7 in 2013.

Assaults decreased by -63 offences or a % of change = -13%. Assaults account for 86% of violent crimes in the 4th quarter of 2013.

Other Criminal Code

Includes prostitution, gaming/betting, offensive weapons, and other criminal code offences (arson, property damage, indecent acts, counterfeiting, etc). Counterfeiting currency offences have decreased by in the 4th quarter of 2013 over 2012, and wilful damage under \$5000 has decreased by -90 offences in 2013 over 2012.

Prostitution offences increased by 11 offences in the 4th quarter of 2013 over 2012.

Please note offences such as drug and prostitution are sensitive to directed enforcement and detection.








Crimes Against Property 4th Quarter Comparison 2012-2013



Total HRM Criminal Code Offences/Drugs

Total Criminal Code offences reported in the fourth quarter of 2013 show a **decrease** of -282 reported offences or a **decrease** of -5.12% compared to the fourth quarter of 2012. Drugs in the fourth quarter of 2013 show an **increase** of 14 offences or an **increase** of 4.50% compared to the fourth quarter of 2012.

Property offences account for **55%** of the reported Total Criminal Code offences, while crimes against Persons account for **13%** and Criminal Other offences account for **32%**.

Property Crimes

Property crime shows a decrease of -99 reported offences or -3.31%.

Stolen motor vehicles decreased by -25 offences or -16.56%.

The Traffic section's monthly theme for February was "Seatbelts, Child Restraint Enforcement" in compliance with the provincial calendar. This included checks of any vehicles that were stopped during regular traffic infractions as well as identified check points to ensure seat belt usage. GO file 15847 covers all of the individual checks and activities associated with this theme. More than 56 entries were made on this theme GO. Seventeen SOTs were issued by HRP officers for seatbelt violations.

Re: National Forum for Law Enforcement in Occupational Safety and Health (LEOSH)

Mr. Jason Snow, who is HRP's chair of the Occupational Health and Safety Committee, is also a member of the Steering Committee for the National Forum for Law Enforcement in Occupational Safety and Health (LEOSH). This is the only forum in Canada that is specific to the Occupational Health and Safety issues of police agencies. In mid-2013, HRP and Halifax District RCMP successfully bid to hold the 2015 National Forum for LEOSH. This will be the second time that the National Forum will be held in Halifax; the first time being in 2008.

Since 2005, HRP has been a part of the National Forum for Law Enforcement in Occupational Safety and Health and has had representatives on the Steering Committee. The members of the Steering Committee, which comprise other police agencies across Canada, are as follows: Edmonton Police, Vancouver Police, Royal Newfoundland Constabulary, Ottawa Police, Winnipeg Police, Saskatchewan Police, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Ontario Provincial Police and Toronto Police. The mandate of the Steering Committee is to promote best practices for Occupational Safety and Health to all law enforcement agencies across Canada by working together to share information on successes within OS&H as well as to help member agencies and all of police counterparts across Canada.

Other agencies have assisted us by supplying best practices regarding eyewear for members, ear protection in noisy environments in addition to other health and safety inquires. HRP has also shared best practices with counterparts across Canada.

The forum is a two-day event, held in June, with sessions for all delegates with various topics in regards to Occupational Health and Safety. Also, there is a meeting of Steering Committee members which occurs the day before the forum starts followed by a networking reception. The Steering Committee discusses the current year's forum, the planning of the following year's forum, the topics associated with the forum and how to increase the membership of the Steering Committee and help the forum grow to include more agencies from across the country.

In 2008, the planning committee, chaired by Mr. Snow, projected having 75 delegates attending at a cost of \$400 per delegate with projected revenue of \$30,000. 107 delegates attended the forum with a profit of \$4,200. HRP at the time committed \$5,000 from the training budget for delegates to attend the forum. Halifax District RCMP committed approximately \$2,500 to have delegates attend the forum.

In projecting revenues to host the forum in 2015, a target of 80 delegates attending the forum has been set, with a cost of \$450 per delegate with a total of \$36,000 projected

revenue. HRP will commit \$6,000 to host the forum and RCMP Halifax District is expected to commit \$3,500. This is a \$1,000 increase to each agency's contribution from hosting in 2008. In addition, in 2015, vendors will be invited to attend and have booths at the Forum over the two days. It is expected that a minor profit will result from the Forum, but the advantages will be many as there will be an excellent exchange of best practices specific to law enforcement.
