Birch Road is an off-leash area but how can one have control of a dog that is not leashed? My wife meets up most days with a lady with eight to 10 dogs, none of which are leashed. How can one person control that many dogs?

My wife took her glasses to Sears Optical the next day and spent \$149.49 to have them repaired.

Sailors Memorial Road in the park has a sign at each end of the road stating, "No Dogs after 10 a.m." — what a joke. There are dogs on that road every now and then.

About five or six years ago in February, my wife was knocked down by a dog. She landed in a puddle of water that was covering a patch of ice. Her right knee was hurt very badly and to this day it still bothers her.

Her clothing was soaking wet but she had to walk to the Tower gym to get me to take her home with her wet clothing on her, cold and soaking wet.

Does the park have a committee to deal with these matters? My wife spoke to someone by phone after the last incident and all they said was that dog owners must have control of their dogs at all times. What a joke. I asked the question, how does one control a dog that is unleashed and going anywhere it wants? I would like the opportunity to be on the park committee and have a say.
