BACKGROUND

In February 2010, Council passed a motion to instruct staff to proceed with an education/promotional campaign to implement Curbside Give-Away Week End Events in HRM to coincide with Environment Week in June and Waste Reduction Week in October. These events have been conducted on June 5 and 6, and on October 23 and October 24 in 2010 and recently on June 11 and 12, 2011.

The following feedback is provided by staff regarding program impact/benefit, communications and opportunities.

IMPACT/BENEFITS

Promoting the 're-use' message aligns with HRM's Solid Waste Resource Management Strategy to maximize diversion away from landfill – goods that can be re-used are re-directed away from landfill.

For the Curbside Give Away event, our measure of success was feedback received from residents. Our webpage received 4,889 page views in the week leading up to the event. We received emails, phone calls, cards and letters from residents in support of the event and photos of some of the treasures collected. HRM's Curbside Give Away Weekend

Environment Week 2011

HRM's Curbside Give Away Weekend is back just in time for Environment Week! June 11th and 12th, 2011.

Here's how to participate:

Place re-usable household items at the curb in front of your home as early as Friday evening June 10th.

Do not give away items that may be infested with bed bugs (e.g., mattresses, furniture, bedding) these are not treasures. Visit the Consumer Product Safety Bureau to find out about items that aren't safe to give away (e.g., baby walkers, lawn darts): www.hc-sc.gc.ca/cps-spc/pubs/cons/garage-eng.php

Only place items that are FREE and place "FREE" stickers or signs on them. Remove leftover items from the curb by dusk on Sunday, June 12th. Consider donating unclaimed items to charitable organizations.

With such a wide variety of treasure possibilities make sure to keep Give Away Weekend in mind before disposing of items for garbage in the upcoming weeks. Your participation in the event will help maximize landfill space by extending the lifecycle of items and making them available for reuse.

Items suggested for give away include books, CDs and DVDs, furniture and small appliances, sports equipment and toys, tools, yard and gardening equipment, kitchen gadgets, dishes, cutlery, pots and pans, unwanted gifts, small bits of re-usable construction material including drywall and hardware, nails, bolts and screws, electronics, clothing and leftover paint.

During your tour for hidden gems:

- Respect other people's property don't walk or drive on people's lawns or gardens.
- Take only the items at the curb marked "FREE".
- Safety First: Obey the traffic laws at all times (e.g., don't block traffic, park illegally or block people's driveways with your vehicle) and watch out for children.
- Don't discard any items on another person's lawn.

What to do with unclaimed treasures:

- Any unclaimed items **MUST BE REMOVED** from the curb by dusk on Sunday, June 12th.
- Check the Yellow Pages under 'Charitable & Non-Profit Organizations' or see the list on the back page of Naturally Green for organizations that may take your items.

- Kijiji kijiji.ca
- If you would consider your items garbage, then you can also place materials out on garbage collection day/week. The usual limits and regulations apply. Visit our website or call 490-4000 for details.

Trying to organize a community litter clean-up? Clean Nova Scotia and Halifax Regional Muncipality can help!

The Great Nova Scotia Pick-Me-Up is a campaign coordinated by Clean Nova Scotia that has long been supported by HRM to encourage Nova Scotians to get together to pick up litter.

All you have to do is select an area you would like to clean up litter, enlist a group of people (friends, family, coworkers, schoolmates, etc.) and register with Clean Nova Scotia by calling 1-800-665-5377 or 902-420-7924 or go on-line to www.nspickmeup.ca. There you can register to receive a FREE Pick-Me-Up kit. Garbage bags, recycling bags, posters, gloves and information on how to coordinate an event will come right to your door.

Litter material from most clean-ups can be disposed of by dividing it between participants and placing it with your household garbage and recycling. Garbage material will count towards the 6 bag limit allowed on each collection day and all other rules pertaining to curbside collection apply. If you have more waste then can be handled curbside, talk to Clean Nova Scotia at the time of registration and they may be able to help.

Nova Scotia Recycles Contest

Loblaw Companies Limited has taken steps towards becoming a leader in Corporate Social Responsibility. Programs such as Carbon Footprint Reduction to improve energy efficiency in stores, transportation fleet and the advancement of wind and solar energy technology are all programs to help sustain our local environment and help us, consumers, make better and more informed decisions . Recently Loblaw have now adopted a new Solid Waste Management program in all Atlantic Superstores in Halifax Regional Municipality (HRM).

Waste management is something that in the past has varied from store to store. Decisions in the past were often made from a corporate office where waste management guidelines vary drastically from our Nova Scotia regulations. Need-

less to say, these national programs did not often coincide with municipal and provincial programs. However, that is changing with their new Solid Waste Management Program starting right here in HRM.

Support comes right from the top of Loblaws corporate structure and corporate

buy-in was the first step for this program. With leadership from Operations VP Tom Flaim and Luc Briand, Store Cleaning & Recycling Manager, a waste management program was designed in partnership with HRM Solid Waste Resource Staff. This program includes a training manual, education plan, public separation bins, visual signage, and department signage that specifically showed each departments waste in its proper waste stream.

Communication from head office was sent out to all store managers and education sessions were booked. Mr. Briand and HRM Solid Waste Resource Staff rolled the program out to each store by educating the store manager and department managers. Department managers were then tasked with rolling the program out in their department which involved placing new bins or reusing old bins, applying both signage and posters, as well as educating staff. Department managers bought into the program and made it their own within their departments.

Store managers have also taken on an ongoing education roll. Commercial waste bins are only unlocked at certain times of the day. Employees take clear bags of department waste to the bin area where the store manager and/or assistants inspect the waste for proper separating and educates as needed. This team effort and ongoing education program has been proven to work. Atlantic Superstores in HRM have been able to improve waste diversion to 77% (on average) since implementing this program!

And the best is yet to come. Atlantic Superstores plan to work with all waste regions in Nova Scotia to develop manuals & program that support that regions waste rules and regulations. Additionally, new waste identification posters are also being designed for staff to more easily decide "what goes where." Staff are also looking at adding solid waste-resource management to the Bronze level training for store level employees, as well as developing new department educational posters.

Great waste diversion has been achieved through the efforts of Atlantic Superstores in HRM and through ongoing improvements and education, there is no doubt that even greater waste diversion will be achieved!

Halifax Water Stormwater Inflow Reduction (SIR) Program

Where Should The Flows Go?

Stormwater Inflow from private property into our wastewater system is a significant problem.

So what is Stormwater Inflow?

During heavy rains and snow melt, high volumes of stormwater enter Halifax Water's wastewater collection systems. These cause sewer backups, overflows of untreated wastewater into lakes, rivers and Halifax Harbour, and poor performance of our treatment facilities. Temporary beach closures often follow due to the high bacteria levels that can result from these overflows.

Halifax Water is taking an active role in addressing this issue through ongoing repairs and enhancements to the parts of the system we own.

But you can help too. Many private property owners may unknowingly be contributing significant amounts of Stormwater Inflow to the wastewater system through sump pumps, drains and downspouts connected to the wastewater system.



Many customers may be unaware that these connections are in violation of Halifax Water's Rules and Regulations. Wastewater customers found discharging stormwater in the wastewater system may be subject to penalties. Stormwater flows from your home must be discharged onto your own property, or into Halifax Water's stormwater system, where applicable.

Halifax Water has implemented the SIR (Stormwa-

ter Inflow Reduction) Program to help comply with new wastewater regulations and to help reduce the frequency of wastewater overflow events.

The SIR Program addresses areas on a priority basis starting in locations where known Stormwater Inflow problems exist, or where significant capital projects are planned such as paving and infrastructure replacement. When Halifax Water inspectors are in your neighborhood, you need to sign up and then follow through on any recommendations. Taking action to address issues will save you time and money in the long run, and being informed is a smart option.

Eastern Passage Wastewater Treatment Facility Project Gets the Go Ahead...

At a hearing held May 12, 2011 the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board gave Halifax Water approval to proceed with the expansion and upgrade of the Eastern Passage Wastewater Treatment Facility(EPWWTF).

This project has been in development since 2003 when it was recognized that the facility was operating at the limits of its design capacity. Population growth in the area serviced by the Eastern Passage WWTF has expanded to the point where the facility is regularly out of environmental compliance.

The EPWWTF project, budgeted at \$61,679,000, will see an expansion in capacity to accommodate projected population growth in the area serviced by the facility over the next 20 years, as well as an upgrade in treatment level from primary to secondary. This upgrade to secondary treatment puts the facility in sync with Canadian Council of Ministers of the Environment (CCME) regulations.

CCME regulations will have a significant financial and environmental impact over the next 25 years, including the upgrade and construction of wastewater treatment facilities to a national performance standard. The Eastern Passage project is slated to get underway later this summer with an estimated construction period of two years.

The design/build project contractor is Maple Reinders Constructors Ltd. and Maxim Construction Inc. Joint Venture (MMJV). Maple Reinders Constructors Ltd. specializes in water and wastewater treatment facility construction. Maxim Construction Inc. is a well known and respected local general contractor.

This project will greatly improve the water quality in Eastern Passage, and the harbour overall for the betterment of the environment and recreational activities.

B'Earthday parties – Looking for an environmentally friendly and unique birthday party idea for your budding David Suzuki? The Adventure Earth Centre now offers one hour of hands-on, age appropriate, fun, inter-active, earth activities facilitated by youth leaders followed up by one hour use of the Adventure Earth Centre for munchies and cake you provide. Think email invitations (reduce), real dishes versus disposable (reuse) and reusable gift bags (recycle). Ideal for school aged children.

Earth Adventures in the Halifax Region Book - Take off on 24 fun-filled adventures along the best nature trails in the Halifax Region. The distances are short but the discoveries great as this guidebook gives you the tools and tricks to explore the wonder in nature. Each trail has an engaging theme with specific directions for hands-on activities at special stops along the way. Adventurers discover a hidden plaque with a secret creature on it at the end of each trail. Each book comes with an attractive poster of the Halifax Region and a set of 24 creature stickers.

Green Child Fund –Proceeds from the sale of the book, birthday parties, camps, programs and performances are used to sponsor children who otherwise might not be able to afford to attend these fantastic environmental camps.

Based on a mystery code and club theme students decipher the lost manual of the Cycle Savers Club, which launches them on an intriguing adventure to appreciate, understand, and respect the cycles of life (air, water and soil cycles) through an action-packed day trip to a local park. This program is currently running in Cole Harbour, Lower Sackville and Fall River. Students return home to complete the final code which takes them on a journey to discover how their household is affecting the environment and what they can do to make a difference.

<u>PLEASE REMEMBER</u>: Recyclables are collected weekly on your garbage/organics collection day in the following areas: Halifax, Dartmouth, Bedford, Sackville, Beaver Bank, Kinsac, Cole Harbour, Westphal, Beechville, Lakeside and Timberlea, Hammonds Plains Road from Bedford to Highway#103, including; Kingswood, Lucasville Road, Pockwock Road, Westwood and Stillwater Lake.

Zone A: St. Margaret's Bay, Prospect, Herring Cove, Sambro, Peggy's Cove, Hubbards, Williamswood, Tantallon–including Sheldrake Heights. Grasseycling

Want a simple way to save up to 40% of the time you spend raking and do something great for the environment? Stop Raking and bagging your grass clippings!

Grass clippings can make up a significant portion of yard waste. During the peak growing season, they can amount to almost 35% of all waste materials collected. By leaving clippings on the lawns (or 'grasscycling') and keeping them in your own yard, you are recycling.

Adjust the height of your mower blade and mow your lawn at least 3 inches high. Taller grass will promote deeper root growth. The added benefit of grasscycling is that you are fortifying and strengthening the turf naturally. The clippings return moisture, nitrogen and other nutrients back to the soil to promote a healthier lawn.

If you have other yard waste that you cannot manage by grasscycling, you can place up to 20 bags of leaf and yard materials curbside on your regular green cart collection day.

Leaf and yard waste must be placed in colourless-clear or orange plastic bags or heavy duty paper bags for collection. Branches bundled are required to be tied securely, up to a maximum of 5 bundles, not exceeding 34 kg and 4 ft in length of branches, will be collected when placed alongside your green cart.
