 - 1 opaque/black bag
 - Remaining bags to be clear
- Bag Limit Reduction
 - 6 to 4 bags



By-Law S-608/ Proposed Amendments to By-Law S-600

Changes to Organic Program

- Removing boxboard as a mandated green bin product (while still permitted as a kitchen scrap material catcher)
- Mandating use of kraft paper bags for separate collection of leaf and yard waste
- Banning grass clippings from collection



Rationale For Change

Meet the objectives of the Community Stakeholders Committee Integrated Resource Management Strategy 1995, reaffirmed by Council January 2014

- Maximize reduction, reuse and recycling of waste resources;
- Maximize environmental and fiscal sustainability of the waste program;
- Foster public stewardship and conservation.



Anticipated Outcome of By-Law Changes

- Increase source separation of waste material
- Ensure source separated material is put in the proper waste stream
- Reduce amount of waste put in landfill
 - Almost 50% of the materials being sent to landfills should be recycled or composted
- Free up capacity at compost facilities
- Better product quality



Council Direction

January 14, 2014 - COW Session

Initiate By-Law amendments for:

- Removing boxboard as a mandated green bin product (while still permitted as a kitchen scrap material catcher)
- Mandating use of kraft paper bags for separate collection of leaf and yard waste
- Banning grass clippings from collection
- Mandate clear bags with privacy option
- Reduce garbage bag limits from six (6) to four (4)



Council Direction

September 23, 2014 – Regional Council

First Reading By-Law S-608, amending By-Law S-600, the Solid Waste Resource Collection and Disposal By-law.

With one minor amendment to the proposed By-law:

That amendment allows for one dark bag to be included in the total bag limit, in place of the nested dark bag in the original motion.



Clear Bags for Garbage

Clear Bags for Garbage

Study of 700+ homes in 3 Halifax Communities over 2 months.

- 65% green cart participation each collection
- 45% blue bag participation each collection
- 8.7% of residents <u>never</u> put out their green cart
- 23.6% of residents <u>never</u> put out blue bag recyclables
- 29.9% of residents <u>never</u> put out paper recycling



Clear Bags for Garbage

Cities/Municipalities with Clear Bags:

- 85% of Nova Scotia Municipalities (46 of 54)
- Province of Prince Edward Island (pop. 145k)
- Markham, ON (pop. 332k)
- Peterborough County, ON (pop. 78k)
- Dufferin County, ON (pop. 56k)
- Huron County, ON (pop. 60k)



Bag Limit Proposal

Reducing from six (6) bags every two weeks













To four (4) bags every two weeks

Organics Program - Boxboard

No Change – Continued use of boxboard as a wrap for wet food waste.



Change - Excess boxboard moves to paper recycling stream.





Organics Program - Leaf and Yard Waste

- No Change Residents can continue to use the green cart for leaf and yard waste.
- Change Shifting from plastic to paper bags for excess leaf and yard waste (no grass).

Implementing Program Changes

Council approved initiatives would be phased in over an approximate six month period:

Hauler Curbside Monitoring

Training for collection contractors

Program Compliance

- No change to current policy
- Non-compliant residential bags/containers will be left uncollected affixed with education stickers

- Implement a public education campaign that helps residents:
 - Clearly and concisely explain the changes
 - Understand, embrace, and accept the changes
 - Foster a positive and progressive attitude

- Mass Media
- Print & Online advertising
- Radio
- Halifax.ca
- Other Halifax channels (schools)



Answers to Frequent Questions

- Green bins can still be used for leaves and yard waste (no grass)
- Weeds/Dandelions/Branches can still be put in green bin
- Garbage cans can still be used but must be lined with a bag (1 may be a dark bag others must be clear)
- Solid Waste staff will help any household who needs assistance in reducing the amount of waste
