SUBJECT: HRM Community Grants Program: Awards 2002-2003.

ORIGIN

The HRM *Community Grants Program* awards annual cash grants to registered non-profit organizations and charities. The focus of these grants is to provide modest assistance to community-based, volunteer initiatives. For the 2002-2003 year the *Community Grants Program* received 150 applications and the total value of requests was \$1,093,874.

The selection of grant recipients is a three-tier process: inter-departmental staff review teams make recommendations to the HRM Grants Committee who then submit a final list of recommendations to Regional Council for approval.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that:

Regional Council approve the *Community Grants Program* as detailed in Attachment 1 of this report, for a total of 111 awards with a total value of \$527,112 for 2002-2003.

BACKGROUND

Grant application forms and a *Community Grants Guidebook 2002-2003* were distributed in September, 2001 and the deadline for submissions was January 31st, 2002. This year's applications demonstrate progress in several areas:

- an increase of 46 (31%) in the number of applications from groups who have not applied to the program in previous years; this is an increase over last year (23%);
- increased awareness of the program among rural communities;
- more realistic request amounts (closer to the \$5,000 ceiling in most categories);
- increased inter-departmental staff participation in terms of referrals, assistance with proposals, and monitoring of grant expenditures.

An area of continuing concern is the number of applications in the Property Development & Community Facilities sector; some of which are HRM-owned and community managed, re-development projects for former schools, or leased from HRM. Grants Program staff are working in collaboration with Real Property Services and staff from other departments towards enhanced viability of these community-operated facilities.

DISCUSSION

Several sectors, **Community Heritage**, have shown an overall improvement in the quality of submissions. The link between heritage conservation grants and municipality's Heritage Property Program is also progressing; HRM grants to this sector help counter the perceived disincentive of heritage registration's higher conservation standards. Assistance is still required in preparing building condition reports and sustainable operations.

The **Community-Based Arts** sector is significantly impacted by multi-year grants to large-scale cultural 'institutions'. Nevertheless, the geographic scope of applicants is broadening beyond the urban core and established professional companies. This sector saw a number of small amateur and semi-professional companies apply to the *Community Grants Program* for the first time; many of these groups have developed through the Fringe Festival, Eastern Front Theatre's "On the Waterfront Theatre Festival", and Neptune Theatre's Ford Centre.

The **Property Development & Community Facilities** sector needs considerable improvement in the quality of proposals, especially in the area of small to mid-size capital projects. Many proposals for new initiatives lack evidence of sustainability, project costing, and life cycle planning. This is an area where workshops for volunteers could benefit community groups.

The *Community Grants Guidebook* continues to be a valuable information and educational tool in support of applicants. Revisions will be made to the *Guidebook* for the 2003-2004 program to target funding and help applicants prepare an application.

COMMUNITY IMPACTS

A total of \$527,112 distributed to 111 community non-profit organizations.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

The recommended awards conform to the approved budget allocation for 2002-2003.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT POLICIES/BUSINESS PLAN

This report complies with the Municipality's Multi-Year Financial Strategy, the approved Operating, Capital and Reserve budgets, policies and procedures regarding withdrawals from the utilization of Capital and Operating Reserves, as well as any other relevant legislation.

ALTERNATIVES

Regional Council could dispute an award, the value of an award, or the lack of an award to a particular organization.

This action is not recommended. Applications are reviewed based on their respective merit and relative to other applicants in the same sector in accordance with the criteria and priorities outlined in the *Community Grants Guidebook 2002-2003*; the *Guide* also includes the score sheet used by reviewers in evaluating an application.
